There were so many unselfish, unrelenting, acts of bravery, courage and heroism that occurred routinely, on a daily basis, as a true and keen sense of duty, that it was taken for granted, unrecognized, and most select, unaccountable for... Which brought forth an inspiring message by Admiral Nimitz, who will live on forever, that; "Among those that fought on Iwo Jima, Uncommon Valor was a Common Virtue".

0:42 – There was no place to hide, no place to take cover, except for the enemy, as they have been prepared for us for the longest time, in those well entrenched, concealed, underground fortifications, which consisted of 800 pillboxes, block houses, gunner placements, bunkers, ratholes, spider traps, ...

...Miles and miles of tunnels and caves. They enemy did not fight on Iwo Jima, they fought beneath it.

3:30 – which brought forth another inspiring message, by then Secretary of the Navy, James Forrestal, that "The fearless and ferocious fighting of the Marines and the Flag Raising on Iwo Jima, guarantees the existence of the Marine Corps for the next 500 years."
